RITES OF PASSAGE

Rites of passage are ceremonies that mark the great moments of life. Aboriginal people share some rites of passage with non-Aboriginal people because we have lived together for hundreds of years: the wedding is an example.

However, Aboriginal Nations have their own rites of passage that are part of their culture. Here are a few examples:

Rite	When	How
Walking out	When the child is about one year old	This is the first time the baby walks outside the family home. He or she walks on a path of conifer branches toward the grandparents or godparents, who hold out their arms. The little boy receives a wooden rifle and the girl receives a doll, symbols of their future traditional roles.
Vision quest	Passage to adulthood	In this ceremony the young person goes off separately, often into the woods, and spends time fasting. A period of reflection during this vision quest helps the young people gain a better understanding of their identity and which spirit could be their guide in life.
Sweat lodge	When you need help	The person enters a tent where hot stones on a fire are regularly sprinkled with water to create steam. The person stays there until the spirits speak, helping with a decision or to gain understanding about what is happening.

Without being rites, some spiritual ceremonies are in important in the lives of many Aboriginal people.

Ceremony	When	How
Offering	> After a hunt	An offering of tobacco or food is made to the spirits of the place or animals to thank them, honour them or to ask a favour.
	During a visit to a sacred site	
Purification	Before important discussions	Sage or another sacred plant is burned, and the person directs the smoke to his head, heart and whole body to purify it.
	Before participating in an event, a rite	
Divination	> Before hunting	An animal bone is heated over a fire and the marks can indicate the location of the game.
Dreams	Each time a dream seems important	Attempt to interpret the symbols in a dream (e.g. animals that appeared) to understand the message of the spirits.
